Pastor's Corner

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Today, we celebrate the Second Sunday of Advent. The Scond Sunday of Advent gives us the opportunity to prepare our hearts in faithful waiting, celebrate the birth of Jesus, and ready ourselves for His Second Coming.

It's a beautiful chance to reflect on the ways prophecy has been fulfilled and to ponder what the future (promised to us through prophecies) will bring.

This week, we pause to remember who God is and what He has done for us. When our lives are hurried, we only have the chance to focus on our to-do lists. Making space in our schedules for prayer and meditation helps us to better see God at work in our lives and in our world.

As we prepare our hearts for the celebration of Jesus' arrival as a gift to all humanity, let's stir up in our hearts and homes a sense of anticipation. May God's spirit transform the days leading up to Christmas into a time of holy anticipation; preparing our hearts, as we faithfully await the chance to celebrate the arrival of our king.

The word "Advent" comes from the Latin word adventus, which means "coming."

Advent in the 4th and 5th centuries was a time of preparation for the Baptism of new Christians. Christians would spend 40 days in prayer and fasting to prepare for the celebration that accompanied the Baptism of new believers.

Over time, Advent was connected to the Coming of Christ. Originally, Christians used this term to reference Christ's Second Coming, but by the Middle Ages, Advent was connected to Christ's First Coming that we celebrate at Christmas.

Advent Season is an invitation to get your mind off the stresses of the year. We can take our focus off of the crazy hustle of the season and the sadness that could accompany the different ways some of us may be choosing to observe the holiday season this year. Even when things feel chaotic, we can find peace in Jesus. Advent is a chance to focus our thoughts on the gift God has given us in His Son Jesus, who stepped down from heaven and took the form of a man so that we might believe.

The tradition for the Second Sunday of Advent includes lighting the second purple candle that is a symbol of faith.

This Second Sunday of Advent, we read, pray, and reflect on the hope God's plan gives us (foretold by the prophets and fulfilled by the life and death of Christ), and we meditate on the promise of Christ's coming glory-filled return.

PREPARE THE WAY

Reflection on Mark 1:1-8

The scholar, Huston Smith, observes that at every time in human history, and in every place, people have found themselves faced with three inescapable questions: How to win food and shelter, which is the problem that the physical world poses; How to get along with one another, which is the social problem; and, How to relate themselves to the total scheme of things, which is the religious problem. (see Why Religion Matters: The Fate of the Human Spirit in an Age of Disbelief).

Whether we look far or near, we will see hunger and homelessness, division and acrimony, confusion and clashing religious views. To place these questions in the context of our Catholic sensibility, Christ is still present in the needs of the least among us, Christ's body is still divided, and Christ still hangs on the cross. Such is our present landscape, the wilderness in which we live together.

"Preparing the way of the Lord" in this wilderness involves not only our own personal repentance and conversion, but also, as Isaiah suggests, some major road construction: creating a highway through the desert, filling in valleys and leveling mountains, smoothing rugged land and rough country. In other words, mindfully and intentionally "bringing comfort to God's people" through our efforts at caring for the most vulnerable, bringing understanding and reconciliation to relationships broken and in discord, and heroically evangelizing to prepare the world for the Prince of Peace.

SAINT JOHN OF THE CROSS

Feast Day: December 14 Patron Saint of: Mystics

John is a saint because his life was a heroic effort to live up to his name: "of the Cross." The folly of the cross came to full realization in time. "Whoever wishes to come after me must deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me" (Mark 8:34b) is the story of John's life. The Paschal Mystery – through death to life – strongly marks John as reformer, mystic-poet, and theologian-priest. Ordained a Carmelite priest in 1567 at age 25, John met Teresa of Avila and like her, vowed himself to the primitive Rule of the Carmelites. As partner with Teresa and in his own right, John engaged in the work of reform, and came to experience the price of reform: increasing opposition, misunderstanding, persecution, imprisonment. He came to know the cross acutely – to experience the dying of Jesus – as he sat month after month in his dark, damp, narrow cell with only his God. Yet, the paradox! In this dying of imprisonment, John came to life, uttering poetry. In the darkness of the dungeon, John's spirit came into the Light. There are many mystics, many poets; John is unique as mystic-poet, expressing in his prison-cross the ecstasy of mystical union with God in the Spiritual Canticle.

But as agony leads to ecstasy, so John had his Ascent to Mt. Carmel, as he named it in his prose masterpiece. As man-Christian-Carmelite, he experienced in himself this purifying ascent; as spiritual director, he sensed it in others; as psychologist-theologian, he described and analyzed it in his prose writings. His prose works are outstanding in underscoring the cost of discipleship, the path of union with God: rigorous discipline, abandonment, purification. Uniquely and strongly, John underlines the Gospel paradox: The cross leads to resurrection, agony to ecstasy, darkness to light, abandonment to possession, denial to self to union with God. If you want to save your life, you must lose it. John is truly "of the Cross." He died at 49 – a life short, but full.

In his life and writings, John of the Cross has a crucial word for us today. We tend to be rich, soft, comfortable. We shrink even from words like self-denial, mortification, purification, asceticism, discipline. We run from the cross. John's message – like the Gospel – is loud and clear: Don't – if you really want to live!
